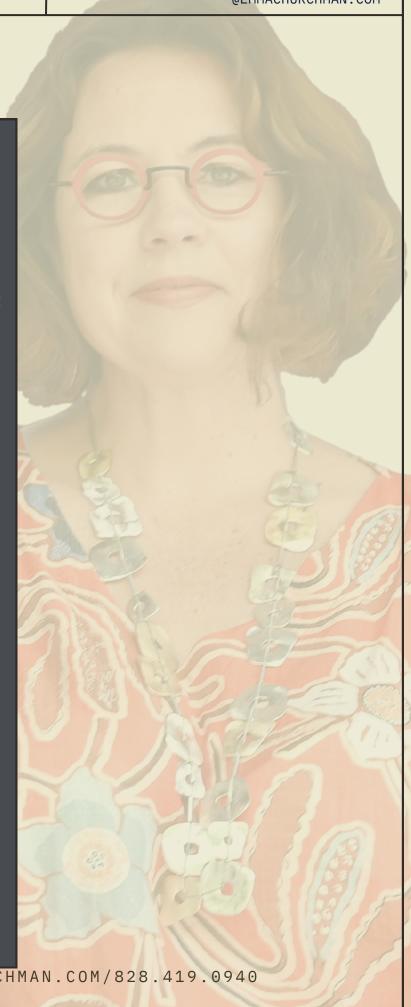

BOOK OVERVIEW

A memoir highlighting the experience of a trauma chaplain and hurricane survivor helping her small rural Appalachian community, and herself, to recover and heal.

When Hurricane Helene struck Western North Carolina in September 2024, Emma Churchman and her husband Jeff found themselves trapped atop a mountain transformed into a flood zone. For 72 hours, they had no way to tell the outside world if they were alive or dead.

After bushwhacking three miles down their mountain, they discovered the true devastation in Gerton, their rural community of 301 people. Within days, lawlessness emerged and life became like the Wild West. As Emma stepped into the role of trauma chaplain, offering solace to people who hadn't yet realized they were traumatized, she faced her own devastating loss - the death of her fourth immediate family member to suicide. While processing multiple traumas, she continued serving others alongside her husband Jeff, who became vital in coordinating communications, and securing supplies and technology.

Together with their neighbors - Erik, a firefighter, and Kate, a botanist and sawyer - they witnessed their community split into distinct camps: Evacuees, Helpers, Donors, Preppers, Looters, and Homesteaders. Through forty days and forty nights, this powerful memoir chronicles how a community stripped of power, cell service, and internet created their own solutions. It's a sometimes funny, often heartwarming testament to what's possible when people have no choice but to come together, transcending social, political, economic, religious, and geological differences to find their way from fear to fierce Love.

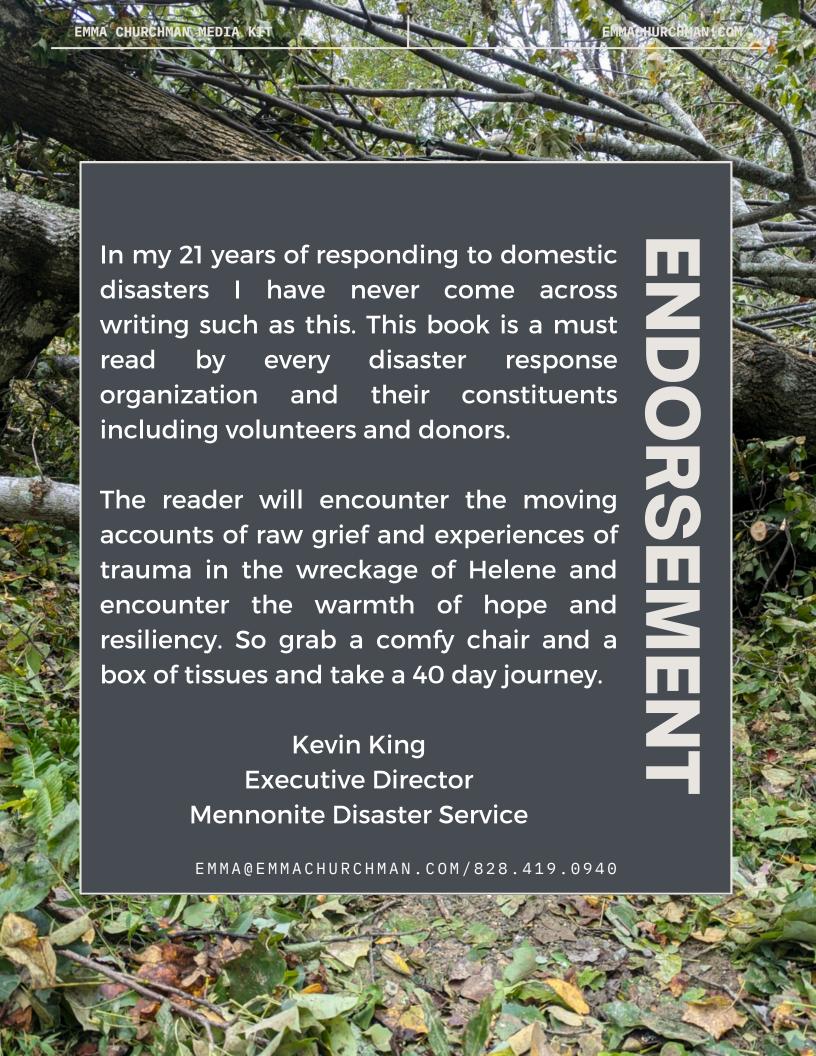

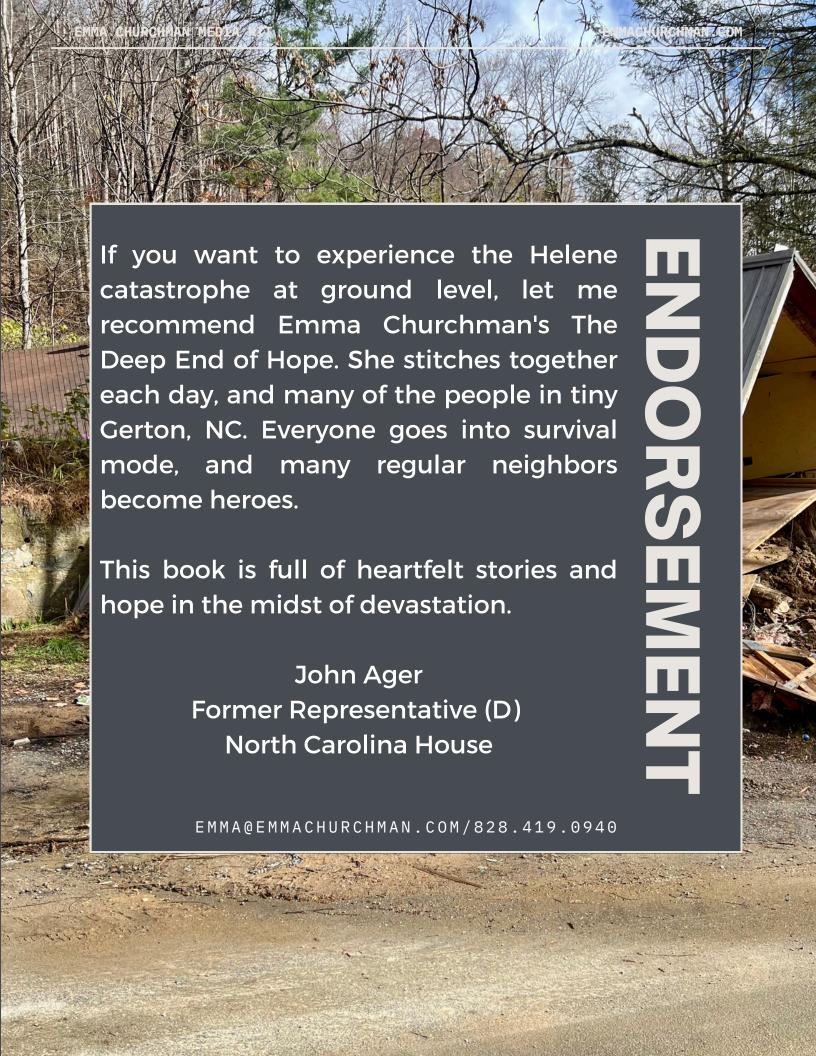

IMPACT

TRAUMA There is no hierarchy of suffering. Pain does not need to be measured alongside someone else's. There is no "right" amount of suffering, or pain, to justify how we are responding or feeling."

Traumatic situations affect each of us differently. There is no right way to process them...Do people really have to wait for someone to tell them to go, when the river is rising? Yes. When there is too much trauma in the genetics and history, people wait to be told."

"There is no "right" way to respond. There is only how we choose to show up in each moment."

TRANSFORMING TRAUMA

"The days of being able to spend a decade on a therapist's couch exploring your feelings are over. We must learn how to process as we go."

"Our opportunity lies in not only being prepared as best we can, but also in learning how to process trauma as we are going through it."

"That is the cost of being human at this time. Our opportunity lies in learning how to process trauma as we are going through it."

"Help us to see the bounty of gifts we've been given, rather than the things that have been taken away."

"I am writing my way through the apocalypse. This is my biggest coping mechanism for trauma. If I can make sense of what happened through words, then maybe, eventually, my heart and body will be able to heal."

HEALING + COMMUNITY

"I don't know how my life will end, just like I don't know what my world will look like a year or five years from now. I hope it will look like our community still coming together and doing what we need to, in order to support each other. I hope our hearts and homes will be rebuilt. I hope that when I drive through our community, I will no longer feel the need to protect myself from the devastation, because I will be surrounded by fiercely protected life."

"Restoration is on the other side of loss. Your trauma can become your superpower. There is equipping even in the greatest of loss. When everything else is ripped from you, your anchors are love and evolution. Fear has no place here."

"Everything that has ever happened, has happened for me."

"Being superhuman means witnessing immense amounts of suffering, and not taking it on as yours. It means helping others to navigate through it. In the wake of this natural disaster, this is a beacon and an opportunity for all of us to consider our purpose and our work in the world, moving forward."

"It's easy for religious differences to create division, especially during times of devastation. The courageous path is to keep searching for unity."

"There is no us. There is no them."

"Helping others has allowed us the ability to heal from and process what has happened in our community. It has made us resilient."

"We become what we focus on."

"Apocalyptic Love is not always patient and kind. It is an advocating Love, a truthful Love, and a Love that challenges us to find new ways of operating."

"The highest potential expression of humanity is rooted in Love. It is time for us to rise to this expression as a species, to save ourselves."

RESILIENCE

"There is no emotional landscape for our current reality. This is unspoken among those of us who stayed. We don't sit around analyzing our lack of emotional response to the apocalypse. It's just a given, a way of life for us right now. This is resilience in action. This is what you do when there isn't the luxury of self-care or being nonfunctional."

"When your home, your possessions, your land, your community, your societal infrastructure, your connection to the outside world, and the people who you love are all gone in a matter of hours, what will you have left? What are you made of, without any of this? What is your identity and your role in this brave new world? We have run out of time for you to figure this out."

DISASTER RELIEF

"Disasters lower psychological barriers and create immediate opportunities for connection and community. Compassion is immediately available. Disasters trigger a deep sense of vulnerability. We are brought together in our grief, our disorientation, and our disbelief, whether we are living in the disaster or observing it from the outside."

"In the highest form of compassion, we are aware that suffering exists, we are empathetic to it, and we are committed to alleviating the suffering that accompanies it. Disasters offer us the opportunity to do all three of these things. Our opportunity, as a people, is to learn how to do this when there is no disaster."

APPALACHIAN PEOPLE

"It is easy to ignore people who do not fight to be seen. This is how an entire culture developed here in the mountains, of people just doing what needs to get done, without asking for help. When help arrives, they do not trust it. It becomes a threat, rather than an opportunity."

"There is an historical mistrust that Appalachian people have of others coming in to help. Their solution is to figure it out on their own, just like they always have. They don't even expect to rely on the kindness of strangers. They just put their heads down and get through. For them, that is what life is about: getting through, not thriving."
