



BRIEF SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES

NEUFELD INSTITUTE UKRAINIAN PROJECT

2023-2026 REASON FOR THE PROJECT

Placing children who are currently in orphanages into the care of families is a priority of the Ukrainian government. In 2023, Neufeld Institute was asked to provide long-term, in-depth training in Ukrainian to Social Workers/professionals working in the adoption system by the Coordination Center for Family Upbringing and Childcare Development of the Ministry of Social Policy of Ukraine.

This project has expanded to providing education for Foster Parents as formally requested by the Coordination Centre in 2024.

We are now also being asked to provide support to refugee families and youth who have been displaced by the war to other European countries. We have received a specific request from a group in the Netherlands and are doing what we can to provide resources with our limited staff and finances.

All courses are being offered to Social Workers/professional and Foster Parents free of charge. We have not received any funding through the Ukrainian Ministry of Social Policy or any of the Social Services agencies in Ukraine.

All donations and grants are used to pay our coordinator and facilitator. Oversight of the project by Senior Faculty and administrative support from the Neufeld Institute is provided pro bono.

We could not do this important work without your generous donations.

ORIGIN OF PROJECT

December 2022

Written request to Dr. Neufeld for on-going in-depth training in the Ukrainian language

from Kyiv Social Service Center in Kyiv, Ukraine. Previously training in the Neufeld model was provided in Russian through our Russian campus.

January to March 2023

Further requests came from Transcarpathian Regional Center for Social Services, Kyiv City Center for Gender Equality and Violence Prevention and the Center for the Provision of Social Services of Vyshneve City Council

March 2023

Neufeld Ukrainian Team was established: Eva de Gosztanyi, senior faculty; Julia Fomina, coordinator; Iryna Shokur, course facilitator

March 2023 to June 2023

Creation of an introductory course to the Neufeld model – “What do children need? Looking through the lens of the developmental approach.”

July 2023 to November 2023

Offering of “What do Children Need” online in Ukrainian to two groups of Social Workers/professionals – 110 participants.

September 2023 to February 2024

Translation of “Making Sense of Aggression” course.

October 2023

Approached for collaboration by the Coordination Center for Family Upbringing and Childcare Development of the Ministry of Social Policy of Ukraine, a governmental initiative to train social workers and others to provide support to families adopting orphans.

February 2024

Signed an agreement with Coordination Center for the Development of Family Education and Childcare to become an official consultant.

March to September 2024

Translation of “Alpha Children” course.

March to December 2024

Offering online courses:

- “Making Sense of Aggression” (x2) - “Alpha Children” - “What do Children Need” to Social Workers/professionals = 435 participants.
- “What do Children Need” to Foster Parents = 77 participants.

October 2024

Registered as a Non-Profit Charitable Organization in Ukraine

October 2024 to March 2025

Translation of “Making Sense of Anxiety” course.

February to December 2025

Offering online courses:

- “Making Sense of Aggression”; “Alpha Children” (x2); “What do Children Need” to Foster Parents = 1,396 participants.

January 2025 to April 2026

Translation of 8-hour course – “The Art and Science of Transplanting children”.

March 25, 2026

Request from the Coordination Centre to provide courses for their Foster Parents

October 2025

Request from Netherlands - Loket Ontheemden Oekraïne (LOOP - Helpdesk for Displaced Persons from Ukraine) to provide support services to professionals supporting refugee families and their children displaced by the war.

January 2026 to present

on-going discussions with the Dutch Neufeld Institute and LOOP to provide support via Neufeld Institute courses and a website. Other countries are also interested in these services.

February to June 2026

Offering online courses:

- “What do Children Need”; “Transplanting” and “Making Sense of Aggression” to Social Workers/professionals = 306 participants.
- “Transplanting” and “Alpha Children” to Foster Parents = 120 participants.

REGIONS SERVED:

Participants have joined the courses from all Ukrainian regions except those in the occupied regions and in the war zone - 25 regions were engaged.

COLABORATIONS:

Official consultant to the Coordination Center for Family Upbringing and Childcare Development of the Ministry of Social Policy of Ukraine - signed February 14, 2024

Over 900 different Ukrainian organizations have been involved in taking the courses.
