- 1. Is it true?
- 2. Can you absolutely know that it's true?
- 3. How do you react, what happens, when you believe that thought?
- 4. Who would you be without the thought?

Turn the thought around (original thought: *Paul doesn't listen to me.*)

- b) to the other (I don't listen to Paul.)
- c) to the opposite (Paul does listen to me.)
