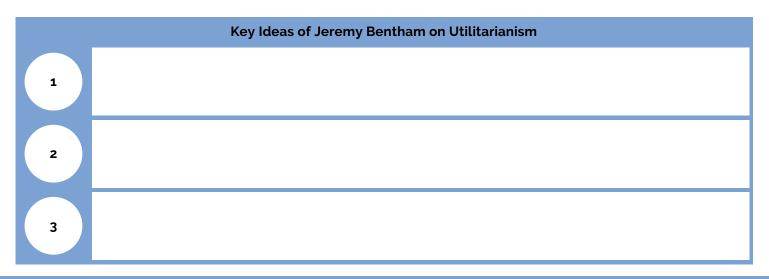

1. Who was Jeremy Bentham and what are his key ideas on utilitarianism?

Jeremy Bentham (1748-1832) was a British philosopher and social reformer best known for formulating utilitarianism. He was a child prodigy: shortly after his twelfth birthday, he went up to The Queen's College, Oxford, where he was awarded a BA in 1763 and a MA in 1766. After graduating, he trained as a lawyer and was called to the bar in 1769, but he never practised. Instead, he dedicated his life to writing and social reform, involving himself in various progressive projects. Make a note about who he was and what he did.
