1. Who was C. S. Lewis and what are his key ideas on situation ethics?

C. S. Lewis (1898-1963) was a British academic, author, and theologian who is most famous for writing The Chronicles of Narnia. He grew up in the United Kingdom, fought in World War I, and graduated from the University of Oxford in 1923 before teaching philosophy and English there. In 1931, he converted from atheism to Christianity, which inspired much of his theological writing for lay Christians. In 1954, he accepted the professorship of Medieval and Renaissance English at the University of Cambridge. Make a note about who he was and what he did.
