- •Canvas Pad (2) 16" x 20" (2) 12" x 16"
- •Bristol: 5 sheets @ 14" x 12.5"
- •Wax thread
- Bookbinding needle
- Book awl/paper piercer
- Clear gesso
- Sewing machine
- •Radiant Rain Shimmering Mist
- Liquitex Professional Acrylics
- •Foam brush
- •Chip brush
- •Small piece of muslin fabric (about 1/8 of a yard)
- •Collage papers: old book papers, vintage wallpaper, inky scrap paper, photo copies of your own artwork, etc.
- •Gel Medium or PVA
- •Ruler
- •#2 Pencil

- Spray bottle with water
- Stabilo All Pencil
- Water brush
- Assorted acrylic paints: Open and Fluid
- •Oil pastels
- Double stick Velcro
- Tim Holtz Distress Stains*

top ten student tips from sandi...

- 1. You are going to use every scrap of your canvases. Leave no corner or edge kinda ordinary. Add color, design and texture literally everywhere.
- 2. Your canvas has no direction. You are going to cut piece from different directions and orientations. Your collage elements need to be pleasing from any angle including upside down. Circles, squares, flowers, leaves, stars, spirals etc work great. Hearts, text, etc. have a direction keep that in mind. Turn your canvas as you work looking at it from every direction.
- 3. I wanted words on my canvas. I tried to achieve this with the Stabilo All Pencil. It smears too much for text. I should have used India Ink. Stabilo gives you an artsy, dreamy look. Ink will be precise. Lesson learned. Another option is to add text as a final stage to your project after cutting and assembling.
- 4. It is easier to darken up a light canvas than it is to brighten up a dark canvas. If you love bright, keep that in mind with every layer you use. Consistency is the key.
- 5. Keep your canvases flat while they are drying. If an edge starts curling, weight the corner with an ink bottle etc. Flat canvases are so much easier to work with.

- 6. If you do not have an awl for the binding process, borrow or buy one. I tried two alternative methods (a push pin and sewing machine) and neither worked very well. I have begged RM to put awls in the store. Order one, you will thank me. Dibs on the first one!
- 7. Want to write your own affirmations? Open up your <u>Pinterest</u> account and look at your quotes board. Your inspiration is there waiting for you. If you don't have a quote board, search quotes. There are some great ones out there.



- 8. These projects make incredible gifts. There is NO WAY I am giving this portfolio journal away because I love it so much. I know I will be making more. Can you even imagine getting one as a gift? Wow.
- 9. My affirmation cards are going to be framed and put on my art studio wall. Instant art!
- 10. Consider doing this workshop with a friend. I sent my friend (Roben-Marie, I know, lucky me) Iphone photo updates and it was so much fun sharing the process with her. You need a friend to squeal with as these take shape.
